

Survey Details




- Survey conducted as primary research for this workshop

When was your baby born?




Was the adoption YOUR decision? (breakdown over time)

In the past year.


1-3 years ago.

Very open.


Semi open, occasional contact.



The Progression of Modern Adoption



- 1950's Closed Adoption, no choices
- 1980's Semi-open Adoption, few choices
- 2000's Open Adoption, more choices
- 2010 and beyond Modern Adoption, complete choices, birth parent driven, social media generation

A Mother's Post-Placement Mindset




- Even with a positive adoption outlook, she may still experience symptoms of grief and loss.
- She will have common post-partum feelings.
- Some may experience feeling of "aloneness" that comes with not having baby with them.
- This time may be emotionally mixed or bittersweet.
- She looks forward to continued contact with the adoptive family and her child.

Your Role at the Pregnancy Center: What can I do for my client who has chosen adoption?



- Start her off with the right adoption referrals.
- Help her focus on her goal or the future.
- Ask her to TALK about her story or feelings.
- Revisit why she chose adoption.
- Offer additional support.

How does the right adoption referral set the tone for her whole adoption?



- When given opportunity to make the choices in her adoption plan, women report a greater satisfaction with her decision.
- All adoption professionals should provide post-adoption support that is:
 - Free of Charge
 - Offered to every mother, before and after birth
 - Tailored to a client's needs
 - Open ended
 - Readily accessible via different methods
 - Focused on the adoption
 - Variety of options

Help Your Client Make the Most of Resources Available to Her



- She may give you permission to call her adoption professional on her behalf, if needed.
- The professional knows all sides of her adoption.
- She may not have friends or family who understand what she's going through.
- Any adoption professional with integrity, and a true heart for birth mothers will WANT to help her, and hear from her, after the adoption.

How do I know what support my adoption referrals are providing my clients?



Call and ask them!

- What do you provide after the adoption in regards to counseling and support?
- Can she still reach you after-hours, even if her adoption is completed?
- Do you tell all clients about your post-adoption support, or wait for her to ask?
- Is there a time limit on the support offered?
- Can someone call years later and expect help?
- Do you have a peer network for her?
- Do you have adoptive families who are truly vested in having an open adoption?
- Who pays for the post adoption counseling or support?
- Do you have third-party, licensed counseling?

Help Her Focus on the Future



Adoption is as much about giving her baby a future, as it is about creating a future for herself.

- What are her goals or dreams?
- Does she want to continue her education?
- What does ongoing contact with the adoptive family look like for her?
- Does she need help creating short or long term plans?
- How will she make healthy choices moving forward?

Give Her an Opportunity to Talk About The Adoption



- Don't assume you know how she feels: Ask her.
 - She may actually express optimism, relief, peace, gratitude, or pride about her choice.
- Her feelings may not be completely adoption-related.
- Let her share her feelings and know grief is normal:
 - Feeling sad does not mean the wrong decision was made.
 - Grief is a normal part of adoption.
 - Revisit why she chose adoption.
 - Remember, adoption grief is different than abortion regret.
- Validate her adoption story by engaging her about it.

What about if my client needs support beyond her adoption professional's resources?



- Referrals for additional post-adoption support:
 - Peer support
 - Licensed counseling
 - Groups, online or in-person
 - Birth Mom Buds
 - Birth Mother Retreats
 - Birth Mother Scholarship
 - Book: So I Was Thinking About Adoption...
 - Brave Love, online stories and regional dinners
- Community programs that address her needs, beyond the adoption.
